# **Opening of long-awaited Leichhardt** Park Skate Park a roaring success!

The much anticipated Leichhardt Skate Park finally opened in the Inner West after years of Council advocacy.

"For more than a decade I have been advocating alongside local young people to win approval and funding for this much-needed recreational facility", said Mayor Darcy Byrne.

"I am pleased to advise the public campaign and legal challenge against the Skate Park from a prominent nearby business was unsuccessful.

"Today, the community has won," said Mayor Darcy Byrne.

Hundreds of inner westies turned up with their skates, skateboards, bikes and scooters to celebrate the

grand opening. Both novices and pro skaters told us that the park was going to be hugely popular for many years to come.

The crowd were treated to a thrilling demonstration from local skaters and a display from the infamous women's Inner West Roller Derby League.

As well as the new \$2.2 million Skate Park, council have invested in upgrading the Bay Run lighting along Leichhardt Park and King George Park to make it safer for all the community.



# Little House, big future

Council has invested \$1.4 million in repurposing the old Summer Hill Depot at 7 Prospect Road into a 'one-stop-shop' for a range of exciting sustainability focused initiatives. At the new Sustainability Hub, exciting projects are already underway. A 'Tiny House' made mainly with reclaimed materials will go to auction on 20 August.

The unique home was built by participants in the Tiny House program - an innovative program run by the Bower Reuse and Repair Centre, which is now located at its new home at the Sustainability Hub. The house, which took just six busy days to build to lock-up stage, is expected to fetch more than \$20,000 and you can make a bid through the online auction.

The Bower has saved over seven tonnes of building materials from landfill in the process of building seven Tiny Houses

since 2014.

# Our Town Halls have been rocking for 100 years

The Town Halls of the Inner West have always been hubs of music, culture and entertainment.

The Inner West Council is in the process of revitalising our town halls so they can once again become hubs of culture, live music and entertainment.

This new approach builds on the heritage of our Town Halls. From 1921 to the mid-1950s, Marrickville Town Hall played host to jazz band, Bert Gibb and the Strollers four nights a week and crowds in excess of 1000 people regularly flocked to what became known as the Strollers Dances.

The sprung, tallowood dance floor was considered the best in Sydney. From 1933, the Saturday Night Strollers Dance was broadcast live on radio. In 1964 a new dance club, Polly's took over. Formed by a group of gay men in the dark days so they could socialise in safety, Polly's Club still meets at the Town Hall today.



# Marrickville treasure

Look down, not up, next time you walk down Marrickville Road

The mural pictured was designed by local Greek artist, Maria, back in 1994 and celebrated Sydney's winning bid for the 2000 Olympics.

The more than fifty mosaics laid into the shopping precinct's footpaths tell the extraordinary local history of Marrickville and the people who made it a top-ten world destination. While this work remains intact, there are other important Marrickville mosaics that are no longer in prime condition.

Initiated by local Marrickville Heritage Society member Rod Aanensen, Council recently passed a motion to investigate costs to repair these unique local landmarks so they can be enjoyed for generations to come.

# Streets of the future

If you find yourself driving down Hutchinson Street in Annandale, look down to see the future.

Council is participating in an exciting new recycling project which is investigating the use of crumbed rubber from recycled tyres to create a modified road asphalt mix.

Council is keen to test the product as a sustainable choice for the future. The Reusing Rubber: Recycling Tyres for Roads Demonstration Project by Southern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (SSROC) aims to make council roads more sustainable, reduce capital and operating expenditure by extending road life, and create a local market for old car and truck tyres.

# Did you know?

- The current pet population is around 79,000 total (approx. 44,000 dogs and 35,000 cats)
- There are currently more inner west households with dogs, than households with a child
- The most popular cat breeds are Domestic, Burmese and Ragdoll
- The most popular dog breed is a Cavalier x Poodle, known unofficially as a 'Cavoodle', followed by Labrador, then Staffy
- The Inner West Council Companion Animal team has provided more than 2,600 free, personalised, pet ID collars and tags to our residents (and counting!)
