Twenty-eight year-old Jamie is one of the youngest people to ever receive the accolade. He was also honoured at last year's Amy Large Volunteer Awards.

"Jamie is an inspirational role model because he serves as an example for the disability community (and the general community) that anything is possible, even for someone living with a physical disability," said Jamie's nominee, Julie Barkman.

"I was very excited and very happy to hear that I was chosen," Jamie said. This year, Senior and Young Citizen awards are shared.

Margaret Tung and Jude Stoddart are co-Senior Citizens of the Year. They are passionate advocates for refugees and volunteers at the Asylum Seekers Centre (ASC) in Newtown. Zarni Tun (18) and Arran Keith (9) are co-Young Citizens of the Year. Both have cerebral palsy, and both have climbed Mount Kosciusko for the Cerebral Palsy Alliance, raising \$11,000 and \$25,000 respectively.

WestConnex update

The construction of the State Government's WestConnex mainline tunnels between St Peters and Haberfield (Stage 3A) has begun with demolition works in Camperdown.

Investigative drilling is underway across the Inner West and preconstruction property condition reports are being offered by the contractor. Inner West Council is also offering a property condition report service to affected homeowners.

As well as noise and air pollution, a major impact of WestConnex is the use of Inner West streets for spoil haulage trucks. Stage 3A trucks will mostly use main roads, but local areas such as Reg Coady Reserve will continue to be affected. All spoil trucks for Stage 3A are required to be fitted with GPS tracking to manage their use of designated routes.

The impacts of Stage 1 and 2 continue to be felt, including insensitively placed electrical cabinets, height detectors and sign footings.

Council continues to work to reduce the impacts of WestConnex on the inner west community.

Street lights go green

Council will spend \$2.8 million over two years replacing 4,516 old fluorescent street light lamps with energy-efficient LEDs.

The new LED lights use just 17 watts to power streetlights, compared to 95 watts used by older lamps. The reduction in carbon emissions in the Inner West will be 1,500 tonnes each year.

This is on top of the 4,000 tonnes-a-year reduction that will result from Council's power purchase agreement from Moree Solar Farm. "Inner West Council is to be congratulated for joining the groundswell of companies, institutions, local and state governments that are taking direct steps to address climate change," said Glen Klatovsky, Deputy CEO of environmental campaign group 350.org Australia.

"For almost 10 years, we've been calling on street light owners (Ausgrid and previously Energy Australia) to replace the old lamps, which consume a lot of power and represent around a quarter of Council's annual electricity consumption," said Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne.

"So now we have taken the initiative to update the over 4,600 streetlights that keep residential roads safe at night, by replacing residential streetlights with efficient Light Emitting Diode (LED) lamps," he said. The cost of the upgrade will be offset by electricity and maintenance savings in less than seven years.

Aboriginal names for wards

Council's five wards now include Aboriginal names:

Ashfield Ward – Djarrawunang (Magpie) Balmain Ward – Baludarri (Leather Jacket) Leichhardt Ward – Gulgadya (Grass Tree) Marrickville Ward – Midjuburi (Lillypilly) Stanmore Ward – Damun (Port Jackson Fig)

Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne said the move would assist the reconcilliation process, adding that this "is an enduring and practical way to show recognition and respect".

The ward names were reached following research on the culture and history of the Inner West, community consultation with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Strategic Reference Group and representatives from the local Aboriginal community.



Council has also recently supported a pilot program teaching children at Tillman Park Early Learning Centre Aboriginal language and culture through song, storytelling and the environment. If successful the trial will be rolled out to preschools across the Inner West.

And at its meeting on Tuesday, 11 December, Council voted to erect three Aboriginal Survival Memorials in the Inner West to commemorate the story of the Aboriginal peoples' survival through the colonisation of this country.

2019-Year of the Library

2019 is shaping up to be the Year of the Library with a wide range of new initiatives set to open up a whole new world of books and borrowing to local residents.

Later this year, the striking, long awaited new Marrickville Library will open its doors.

As well, there are major technology upgrades planned for most of the other libraries – including the new cloud-based library membership and catalogue which launched in late February.

For members, this means access to a fantastic catalogue of over 1.4 million items via any electronic device.

Big news for small bars

Council is making it easier to open a small bar in Leichhardt, Annandale, Rozelle, Lilyfield, Balmain and Birchgrove.

Restaurants or café owners in these suburbs no longer need to lodge both a Development Application to Council and a separate application to the NSW Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority (ILGA).

Small bars in recognised shopping streets are also exempt from car parking provisions.

Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne said promoting small bars in existing shopping corridors creates "precinct destinations".

"As more small bars open, we will see a boost to tourism and spending in our local economy as well as more opportunities for local live music, arts and culture," he said.

"I will certainly be proposing that Council extend this provision to all businesses in the Inner West Council area as part of the new Inner West Council planning framework," he said.

Ashfield Aquatic Centre **upgrade**

Hundreds of locals filled the Council chamber late last year to hear that Council had appointed a tenderer for the construction of the new state-of-the-art Ashfield Aquatic Centre.

Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne said Council was determined to transform Ashfield Pool "into a first class facility for the whole community to enjoy for generations to come."

David Collins-White, President of Ashfield Amateur Swimming Club, said the club and Haberfield Public School were overjoyed. "We wish to thank all the councillors who voted for the development to proceed. The legacy of the vote will be a dividend for the whole Inner West community for the next 50 years." The final plan for the

redevelopment of the Ashfield Aquatic Centre includes:

- A new 50m indoor pool with accessible ramp and split boom
- A new outdoor pool with floating floor that can change its depth
- A new children's leisure pool with landscaping and green wall
- A new two-storey entry building with café, change areas, crèche, staff facilities and retail space
- A new 1,000sqm gym on Level 2 of the entry building
- New sauna, steam and spa attached to the existing pool hall building
- A community green space and covered seating
- Landscaping areas and terraces for the external pools
- Increased parking spaces
- Increased parking spaces



Council grants past, present and future

Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne presented Council's 2018 grant cheques worth \$362,000 to the 91 recipients at a special reception in December.

The evening featured presentations from past grant recipients who talked about their project achievements.

The Inner West's Solidarity Choir performed, as did Nardi Simpson, who sang a Welcome Song.

The Inner West Council Grants Program assists groups and individuals to deliver programs and services which address identified needs and improve community wellbeing.

The grants enable Council to support the diverse range of community and volunteer groups in the Inner West to achieve shared objectives.

Grants of up to \$7,500 are available annually across five grant rounds, including Arts and Culture, Community History and Heritage, Community Wellbeing, Environment and Recreation. The grants program will open again in mid-2019 for new applications.

Tanks can reduce water use by 25% or more.

"I'm delighted to have the tank to help futureproof my place against changeable climate and droughts," she said.

Rainwater tanks also help reduce the amount of polluted stormwater entering our waterways.

Council runs free workshops every month. Residents can learn about selecting the right kind of tank, upkeep involved, and how to get the most from the tank.

2018 Business Environment Award winners

The environmental achievements of more than 20 Inner West businesses were celebrated at Council's Business Environment Awards, held in November at Camperdown Commons.

Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne presented the awards which recognise local businesses achieving great things for our community and economy.

The prestigious Sustainability Leadership award was won by Feather and Bone, for its far-reaching, holistic sustainability impacts. The business is not only reducing its own energy consumption, but also innovating in new product areas, and its core business is expanding, strengthening and advocating for sustainable livestock farming.

Feather and Bone in Marrickville also won the Beyond our Four Walls award for influencing supply chains beyond its operations for sustainable outcomes. The business promotes transparency and visibility in the meat industry and only works with suppliers who focus on building healthy soil, plants and animals, helping to provide alternatives to intensive farming.

Heritage listing for iconic mural



Council has voted unanimously to nominate the iconic and much-loved Crescent mural in Annandale for heritage listing.

The mural was commissioned by the then-Leichhardt Council in 1980 and was created by artist Rodney Monk.

It depicts the community activism around key events such as opposition to the Vietnam War and the sacking of the Whitlam Government and social movements such as personal liberation including sexuality, gender, racism and ethnicity, and the selfexpression of alternative lifestyles and cultural activities.

"Each image has a back story. To me the most significant are the lack of Aboriginal content in the 1980 original, which was redressed in the 2005 repaint, and the images addressing pollution in the area – including water, air and noise pollution," Mr Monk said.
