

Food recycling coming to every Inner West house

Following the delivery of a food recycling program to apartments throughout the Inner West, a full food organics and garden organics recycling program will be rolled out to every Inner West household in October.

Renowned landscape architect and sustainability activist Costa Georgiadis joined Inner West Mayor Darcy Byrne and Councillor Mat Howard to announce the commencement of the new food recycling scheme for the Inner West.

Costa said, "The fact that food recycling is going to roll out across all of the Inner West and all of the Inner West residents can take their food waste out of the red bin and put it into the green bin is awesome news.

Because when we separate our food waste, we're contributing big time to reducing landfill and carbon emissions."

Mayor Byrne added, "Preventing food from rotting in landfill and releasing methane is the single most important thing our local community can do to combat

climate change. Better still, this will save ratepayers millions of dollars in landfill fees in the years to come."

More about the food recycling program:

- ► A comprehensive education program will lead up to the rollout in October
- ► Every apartment in the Inner West has already been delivered a burgundy-topped kitchen caddy
- ▶ In September, a green-topped kitchen caddy will be delivered to every house in the Inner West
- Weekly pick up of green and burgundy bins will begin in October

We'll keep you posted as we get closer to rolling out the food recycling program.



Coming soon Inner West Sustainability Hub!

On 1 July, Inner West Council will launch the brand-new Inner West Sustainability Hub, designed to put exciting environmental initiatives at the fingertips of residents.

The highly curated space, located at the old Council depot, 7 Prospect Road Summer Hill, will provide resources, services, and information on sustainability initiatives in partnership with local organisations,

such as The Bower Repair & Reuse Centre, TOMRA (Return and Earn), The Village Project, and Dress for Success Sydney.

The Hub will also feature electric vehicle charging stations, street libraries, bike tune-ups, and Council's Green Living Centre services, among others. Inner West Mayor, Darcy Byrne, is excited to provide a one-stop shop for residents to learn about and engage in sustainability initiatives.

The Hub aims to empower locals with the knowledge and resources to take action in their daily lives, and make a positive impact on the environment.

EV charging stations coming to the Inner West

The Inner West is making it easier for residents to recharge their electric vehicles (EV) even if they have no off-street parking.

Our new EV Encouragement Strategy will see us partner with EV charging providers to establish up to 50 charging stations throughout the Inner West.

We'll also be requiring the provision of EV charging stations in all new major developments and streamlining approvals for both private and public EV charging facilities.

In addition, we're transitioning our own fleet of vehicles to EVs and encouraging local car share operators, taxi companies and ride share operators to do the same.

- Simplified approval for charging on private property

Indigenous health advocate honoured in Community Awards


Health advocate and Bundjalung Elder Boe Rambaldini has been recognised for decades of community service by being named Inner West Council Adult Citizen of the Year.

The Marrickville resident was honoured at a community celebration held on Friday 19 May at Marrickville Town Hall.

"He is a man of incredible wisdom, marvellous personality and a person who has had in the past no voice, and now has a voice and is using it so well advocating for Aboriginal people," said Jane Massa, who nominated Rambaldini for the award.

"People like Boe are just so incredibly generous that they immediately say 'yes' to working in their own time, on a committee to help other people."

Rambaldini is the Statewide Oral Health Manager for NSW Health and the Director of the Poche Centre for Indigenous Health School of Medicine.

Remembering Chrys Meader

The ceremony was attended by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese, Mayor Darcy Byrne, members of the Marrickville Heritage Society, Chrys's family, and former colleagues. The Prime Minister described Chrys as instrumental in bringing local history to life, and the naming of the auditorium as a fitting tribute to her legacy. Mayor Byrne added that Chrys Meader was a unique character who knew more about the history of the Inner West than anyone, and renaming the auditorium was the best

King George and Easton Park upgraded - and more to come

King George Park in Rozelle and Easton Park in Lilyfield have recently reopened following major upgrades.

The investment of \$4.2 million in improvements to King George Park includes an upgraded sports field with new turf, regrading and sub-surface drainage. There's also an improved long jump facility, new sports field lighting to enable nighttime training and construction of a new carpark with accessible car parking spaces and pathways, lighting and garden beds.

Improved amenities including female-friendly change rooms will also be delivered in the coming year.

At Easton Park, we've invested \$500,000 in creating new sub-surface field drainage, regrading the surface, and laying new turf. This improved surface and drainage will help local sporting clubs use the ground more reliably for training and games.

These upgrades are part of our extensive \$5.2 million program to improve the sports grounds throughout the Inner West in the next financial year. Some of the sports grounds we'll be upgrading include \$2.1 million at HJ Mahoney Reserve in Marrickville, a \$1.1 million new amenities block at Tempe Reserve and a \$2.5 million upgrade to Camdenville Park, among others.









Running for life

It's not often we put staff in the spotlight, but Dean Law's story is exceptional and truly inspirational.

Dean started work for Council at the Balmain Depot 32 years ago and for the last 22 years, has been a much-loved member of the Leichhardt Park Aquatic Centre team.

Diagnosed with Parkinson's in his 50s, he turned to exercise to fight off the symptoms and completed his first marathon aged 60. He continues to run and run, fundraising for Parkinson's NSW, raising more than \$116,000 to date.


