Soft plastics recycling is here

Soft plastics recycling is returning to key Inner West supermarkets, following sustained advocacy from Inner West Council and the strong backing of the local community.

In a concerted campaign, Inner West Council has been working with state and federal government, industry organisations and supermarkets to return recycling of soft plastics to our community.

A soft plastics recycling trial in Woolworths Balmain has been highly successful.

Council is pleased to announce that Woolworths has confirmed it is rolling out a soft plastics recycling trial across selected Inner West stores at Ashfield Mall, Ashfield North (Bland Street), Leichhardt MarketPlace, Metro Illawarra Road (old Banana Joes), Marrickville South and Marrickville Metro.

The collection points will allow residents to responsibly dispose of soft plastic packaging, which cannot be placed in household recycling

bins. The soft plastics are then recycled at a facility in Warragamba and transformed into a highquality building product, which can be used to replace less sustainable materials such as plywood, plasterboard and tiles.

Council has committed to improving our procurement practices to incorporate this plastic aggregate in the construction of road bases, play equipment and other products.

This comes after Inner West Council has expanded its doorstop recycling program -

accessible by all Inner West residents to include the unlimited collection of soft plastics.

Our Fairer Future Plan

Inner West Council has released our Fairer Future for the Inner West plan to fix the housing supply crisis in our community.

What changes are we making?

This will be achieved through rezonings that will allow increased residential densities around transport hubs and main streets with 6 to 11 storey buildings in select precincts.

These plans have been developed by independent planning and architectural experts and Council staff, through a block-by-block assessment of where housing can best be located.

Heritage conservation areas are proposed to be protected, with the higher densities in town centres and transport hubs allowing for the necessary new homes.

The plan is underpinned by a detailed commercial viability analysis that demonstrates the increase in densities needed to make development feasible and to ensure that the new homes are actually delivered.





Why are we making these changes?

The plan will enable an additional 35,000 homes across the Inner West to be built over the next 15 years, meaning that thousands more essential workers, young people and renters can live in the community they love.

Fairer Future has been developed as an alternative to the NSW Government's housing reforms and achieves more homes across the whole of the Inner West, with a fairer and more even distribution of density across the whole area.

Our Fairer Future for the Inner West plan is a blueprint for how we can fix the housing supply crisis in our own backyard. Currently, we simply don't have enough homes here for people to live in. This is driving up the costs of housing, making it unaffordable for many Inner Westies.

This plan is our opportunity to build the homes needed so that our children and grandchildren will have a place to live here in the decades to come. more homes more heart

Frequently asked questions

What's changing?

Our alternate approach updates planning controls for land use, building heights and densities in select precincts, while protecting heritage conservation areas. The plan also identifies the new infrastructure and community facilities needed to support an increased population. Through our new Inner West City Architect, we will also ensure that the design of these new homes is high quality and adds to local amenity.

Why is this good for the Inner West?

This plan will provide diverse housing options, including affordable, family-friendly apartments, and create vibrant, walkable communities while preserving the unique character of our neighbourhoods. By taking action now we can make sure that more young people, renters and essential workers can live here now and that our children and grandchildren will have homes here in the future.

Work is scheduled to commence in the second half of 2026.


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Inner West Citizen of the Year is Professor Richard Scolyer AO

The 2025 Inner West Citizen of the Year has been awarded to Professor Richard Scolyer AO.

This award is in recognition of the impact Professor Scolyer's work has made on the lives of Inner West people and the hope and inspiration he has given to our whole community while facing adversity himself.

There are many Inner Westies alive today because of the breakthroughs that Professor Scolyer and his colleague Professor Georgina Long have made in the treatment of melanoma.

Countless more citizens will have their lives saved and prolonged because of their research in the decades to come. More than that, the selflessness and compassion with which Professor Scolyer has approached his own very sad diagnosis has touched the hearts of everyone in the Inner West and people across the nation.

Richard's determination to continue experimenting in treating his own cancer, and to keep sharing his story, has demonstrated a profound bravery that we have all found deeply moving.

This award is in recognition that through his work and his example Professor Scolyer has given our people hope that we can keep walking forward through adversity. In doing so he has become an Inner West legend, whose story will be handed down from generation to generation.

His life's work has been based at the nearby Royal Prince Alfred Hospital where he has dedicated himself to the health and welfare of our citizens.

Richard has been a proud member and volunteer for the mighty Newtown Swans AFL club over many years. He is a regular at the GreenWay Parkrun, along Hawthorne Canal, a community event that he has kept participating in throughout his treatment.

Richard Scolyer is a shining example of what is best about the Inner West. We believe that as citizens we hold a responsibility to contribute to the betterment of our whole society.

We thank Professor Scolyer for everything he has done for us.

Major upgrade to Camdenville Park now complete

Council celebrated the official opening of the upgraded Camdenville Park with locals on Saturday 17 May, which included the unveiling of a prestigious heritage Blue Plaque.

Council invested in and delivered this major \$8.2 million upgrade to Camdenville Park.

Improvements to Camdenville Park include:

 Sports field upgrade including new irrigation, turf and sustainable LED floodlighting

- New playground with additional shaded sails and picnic facilities
- A new BMX pump track and little kids pump track
- A refurbished amenities building
- Stormwater upgrades to reduce the risk of localised flooding
- New lighting on the shared paths
- Upgrades to Peter Bulger Wetland including stabilised embankments with native vegetation to filter and enhance water quality.

Council secured \$500,000 in funding from the Federal Government's Urban Rivers and Catchments Program to upgrade the Peter Bulger Wetlands.

Camdenville Park has a rich sporting legacy, and the heritage Blue Plaque commemorates the first NSW Aboriginal Rugby League Knockout (Koori Knockout) held at the oval in 1971.

Founding members of the tournament attended the opening event to celebrate the unveiling of the Blue Plaque including Uncle Bill Kennedy, Professor Bob Morgan AO, Lee Simpson and Christine Corby AM.

Since its inception in 1971, the Koori Knockout has become one of Australia's major sporting and cultural events, growing from seven men's teams to 164 men's, women's and junior teams today.

The park will now also become the Pride Sports Hub of Australia and home to Sydney Rangers Soccer Club, Flying Bats Football Club, and the Sydney Women's Baseball League.

Looking after our roads

How do we decide which roads need priority work for upgrades and repairs?

It's Council's responsibility to maintain our roads and this includes street sweeping, pothole repairs, refreshing line-marking and re-sheeting. To do this, Council does regular audits every four years.


This information is then used to prioritise road repairs and maintenance.






Careers in council

Inner West recently celebrated our 29 apprentices, trainees and cadets in the Fresh Start program with Premier Chris Minns and Minister Ron Hoenig visiting our St Peters Depot.

This NSW Government program enables students and school leavers to study and learn on the job while gaining a nationally accredited qualification. Fresh Start funds their wages so local councils can employ and train a younger generation for careers in council. This program also supports much-needed skills growth in local trades such as plumbing, automotive and mechanical work.



Council has completed work on a much-needed cycleway upgrade from Sydenham Station to St Peters.

This \$1.3 million investment will see improved safety for cyclists travelling between Marrickville and the city.

These improvements have been delivered a month early and aim to create a safer, greener and more accessible corridor for cyclists, pedestrians and residents in the Inner West.





From little things big things grow

From humble beginnings at Camdenville Park in 1971, the Koori Knockout has become a major event in the rugby league calendar. It was initiated by six men and one woman: Bob Smith, Bob Morgan, Bill Kennedy, Danny Rose, Victor Wright, the late George Jackson, and Barbara Flick. They formed the Koorie United Club with sponsorship from former Marrickville Council, where three of the committee members worked. In 1971 Koorie United hosted the first Koori Knockout at Camdenville Park to provide an event where talented Aboriginal players could showcase their skills, talent and flair to the talent scouts from professional clubs. However, it was always about more than just footy: it was about family, community and people coming together to enjoy and celebrate culture and connection.

The first Knockout featured seven teams: Koorie United, Redfern All Blacks, Kempsey, La Perouse, Walgett, Moree and a combined Mt Druitt / South Coast side. La Perouse won. The Knockout was played at Camdenville Park until 1975. In the decades that followed, the Koori Knockout has grown from seven men's teams in 1971 to 164 men's, women's and junior teams today. A prestigious Blue Plaque has recently been unveiled at Camdenville Park to honour their legacy.



Street blitz begins

Inner West Council has launched a new 'Street Blitz' program to provide intensive maintenance and street cleaning of main streets across the Inner West.

The new Street Blitz program will see Council deploy up to 30 staff on a single day to repair, upgrade and intensively clean our streets.

Council will expand the program to main streets across all five Inner West wards.

These works will beautify our main streets, including high pressure cleaning of footpaths, hand cleaning of furniture, removal of posters, maintenance and painting of street furniture, graffiti removal, replacement of all street and traffic signs, street tree and ornamental garden replanting, street tree pruning and mulching and weeding of garden beds.

Darling Street gets an upgrade

Council has upgraded the intersection at Darling Street and Elliott Street in Balmain.

We invested \$460,000 to improve this space for locals and road users.

We have put in new paved footpaths and landscaped garden beds.

The upgraded traffic islands, improved pedestrian crossings and smoother road surfaces will also make it safer for pedestrians and drivers.



Over 100 EV charger ports now installed

Inner West Council has hit a major sustainability milestone, with the successful installation of over 100 public electric vehicle (EV) chargers in the Inner West, with more to come.

With figures showing current and projected EV ownership in the Inner West exceeding national averages, Council worked to deliver access to reliable EV chargers for our community.

The rollout of these public chargers was funded by NSW state government grants, with the installation being executed via several publicprivate partnerships.



GreenWay close to completion

The Cooks to Cove GreenWay is now 80% complete. The biodiversity, walking and cycling route from the Cooks River in Earlwood to the Bay Run at Iron Cove will be completed this year.

The 5.6km shared path will provide public art, ecological restoration and recreational opportunities for the Inner West community.

Premier Chris Minns joined councillors to celebrate the recent works to close the missing links of this \$42 million project, including the completion of Richard Murden Reserve and a path and lighting upgrade on a section of the Bay Run at Lilyfield.

Work continues at the Hercules Parklands, Constitution Road and Johnson Park, and the Cadigal Reserve and Parramatta Road underpass.

Established in 1975, Reverse Garbage is an internationally recognised not-for-profit creative reuse centre dedicated to diverting commercial and industrial waste from landfill and giving it new life. It plays a critical role in both our local and regional circular economy, diverting waste from landfill and draws thousands of visitors from out of area to Marrickville each year.

Reverse Garbage was located at the Addison Road Community Centre for decades before relocating to a warehouse at 30 Carrington Road, Marrickville. Reverse Garbage will host their 50 year anniversary celebration in September this year.




