One rating system

By law, all amalgamated councils must harmonise rates from July 2021. Council is not increasing its overall income, but your rates may change. The changes may be brought in gradually if the NSW government passes legislation.

Council recently consulted the community about the proposed changes which include a new minimum rate. The results were considered by Council at an Extraordinary Meeting on 23 February.

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal, which must approve the new minimum rate, will accept community submissions in March.

Council 2020 grants announced


Eighty-nine Inner West projects have received more than \$500,000 in Council funding, as part of the Inner West Council 2020 Grant Program.

Hilary Bell and Luke Styles (pictured) successfully applied for \$5,000 for *The Annette Kellerman Project*, a free music theatre performance celebrating the life of Marrickville icon, Annette Kellerman, at Annette Kellerman Aquatic Centre.

"It is a privilege to be supported by funding from Council to undertake the creation of a new work unearthing the extraordinary life of Inner West superstar Annette Kellerman," Luke said. "It gives an artist the confidence and encouragement to be daring and make original work on local themes with international appeal."

Other funded projects include:

- Diversity Arts Australia received \$10,000 for I Am Not A Virus.
 Ten Asian Australian artists will respond to COVID-19 racism
- Inner West Icons podcast received \$10,000 over two years. Hosted by a historian, each episode presents history through, oral histories, community stories, sound effects and music
- Mood Active Association received \$5,000 for a four-week 'wellbeing workout', combining education and exercise and targeted at people suffering from mood disorders including anxiety and depression
- The Salvation Army received \$10,000 over two years for Good Egg Garden, an environmental and eco-educational chicken and sustainable garden project, engaging children experiencing trauma of family violence
- Queer Lunar New Year 2021: Year of the Ox received \$5,000 for a multi-disciplinary event melding traditional oral storytelling traditions with contemporary experimental innovations
- Marrickville Football Club received \$8,200 over two years for Kick On for Women, an introductory program for women who have never played soccer before but who want to stay active and have fun with friends

New handrail and steps improves access

Council installed a new handrail and steps in Ewenton Park in late 2020 to improve access.

The installation was in response to an elderly resident who wrote to Council about her struggle to negotiate the path from her house to the park.

"We try our best to help out our residents - especially the elderly who also have a right to enjoy ease of access to inclusive and welcoming open space," said Aaron Callaghan, Council's Parks and Recreation Planning Manager.

More shade sails

Council installed a shade sail at Annette Kellerman Aquatic Centre in February and at Fanny Durack Aquatic Centre in December as part of the ongoing Shade Sail Program.

A shade sail will be installed at the Elizabeth Street Ashfield pocket park in March.

Since 2018-19, 22 shade sails have been installed in Inner West parks, at a cost of \$850,000 so far.

Arts and music to be legalised in industrial & main street premises

Council has now adopted a policy so small scale artistic and cultural events can take place in industrial zones and main street premises throughout the Inner West.

The policy, which I initiated with Stanmore Ward Councillor Anna York, aims to counteract the shrinking number of live music venues and artistic spaces throughout Sydney.

Live performance and exhibition will be able to take place as "exempt development" with an audience of up to 150 people in industrial premises and 80 people in properties in local centres (based around main streets).

There will be no need for a development application to be submitted, making thousands of new spaces available at low cost for artists to perform, practice and exhibit their work.

This will allow local musicians, actors and visual artists to make use of shopfronts, warehouses and office spaces, which are currently sitting dormant and unused after dark.

The finalised policy has been submitted to the State Government. We are waiting for them to gazette the policy so that these new, common-sense rules can be rolled out in 2021.

Inner West is Sport NSW Council of the Year



Public art partnership

The Marrickville Metro redevelopment will feature striking and eyecatching public art, though a partnership with Inner West Council.

Local and internationally renowned artists selected through the open EOI process include Georgia Hill, Liz Shreeve, Helen Proctor and Fintan Magee.

The first round of commissions were installed in September and October 2020, with further works commencing this year.

The redevelopment is expected to be completed mid-2021.

Pop up tree transforms former dump site

Locals celebrated the new 'pop up tree' and public artwork in St Peters in December.

The pop-up tree is part of Council's multifaceted approach to greening our neighbourhoods, tackling unwanted tagging, and illegal dumping.

The artwork, by Kim Siew, is inspired by the area's native flora.

The former dump site is now not only a contemporary art pop up but also a community garden – with locals contributing numerous pot plants to the industrial spot at the end of their street.

Food organics success

Council has recovered 350 tonnes of food organics in the six months since commencing the new collection service in Marrickville.



Food recycling is now available to more than 16.000 units



80% of properties present their bins for collection every week

The food recycling service is based on the Leichhardt service which has been operating since 2008 and the Marrickville service area which was introduced in September last year. Combined, the food service now includes more than 650 apartment buildings recovering an average of 520 tonnes of food waste annually.

Apartment buildings in the Ashfield area are scheduled to receive this service in 2021.
