

Standing up for our community against Westconnex impacts

For years our whole Inner West community has endured massive impacts from Westconnex construction.

Now with the opening of the Rozelle Interchange and Parklands we are having to fight hard to protect our community from traffic chaos and asbestos contamination.

For over a decade our community warned the previous NSW Government of the traffic chaos that would occur when Westconnex was completed.

In December, when the Rozelle Interchange opened, that's exactly what we saw, with unprecedented congestion on Victoria Road, the City-West Link and the ANZAC Bridge.

Worse still, in January significant asbestos contamination was discovered at the newly opened Rozelle Parklands.

"We were promised nirvana when the Rozelle Interchange opened, but all we've been left with is a tunnel to a traffic jam and an asbestos mess in the Rozelle Parklands," Mayor Darcy Byrne said.

"We are taking strong action to mobilise our community and demand that these unacceptable impacts are fixed."

Lewis Herman Reserve opening

Named after Ashfield's longest serving and much-loved Mayor, Lewis Herman Reserve was opened by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese on December 4 last year.

It was a spirited event with Mayor Darcy Byrne, Minister for Transport Jo Haylen, MP for Heffron and Minister for Local Government Ron Hoenig and Lewis Herman's son David celebrating the legacy of Mayor Herman.

It's a special place as it's also Australia's first purposebuilt dementia park. Mobility for people with dementia is a major issue and the design of the new reserve has wide paths, providing access to areas of interest for those using walking frames and in wheelchairs.

It's a genuinely multi-generational recreation space and features a new playground, youth space, adventure play area, picnic and passive recreation facilities including shelters and BBQ for the whole community to enjoy.



Mardi Gras screening

After the success of last year's screening of the Mardi Gras parade in family friendly Camperdown Memorial Rest Park, expect this night out to be even bigger and better this year.

Plan your evening and enjoy the free, huge live screen bringing you all the fabulous action of Oxford St but in a gorgeous park setting while enjoying a sit-down picnic with the locals. Rozelle parklands asbestos update

In December our long fight for additional funding to complete the Rozelle Parklands was concluded successfully with the NSW Government agreeing to provide an additional \$20 million to improve the park over time.

So it was frustrating for our whole community to discover in January that asbestos contamination was found in the mulch used in the Parklands as well as other landscaped areas near Victoria Road.

Council took immediate action to demand the mess be cleaned up, including:

- Thorough and urgent testing of the entire Parklands for asbestos contamination.
- The complete removal of all potentially contaminated material from the Parklands. Transport for NSW has now agreed to this and the clean up is being carried out.
- A thorough investigation of how this contamination could possibly have occurred and for the contractors or suppliers responsible to be held to account.





New Aboriginal memorial

Following very positive public engagement earlier in 2023, Inner West Council is creating an Aboriginal Survival Memorial in Yeo Park in Ashfield.

Breathe, by Indigenous artists Nicole Monks and Maddison Gibbs, features 246 hand carved and inscribed sandstone boulders, which have been engraved and will be carefully placed to act as portals to ancient stories.

The contemplative artwork celebrates the proud story of First Nations peoples in overcoming colonisation, disposession and injustice.

The memorial is due to be complete by January 2024.

Memorials will also be created in Illoura Reserve, East Balmain in 2024 and Kendrick Park, Tempe, in 2025.

The bat tunnel

The Greenway works continue with the aim of joining up the Cooks River to the Parramatta River at Iron Cove as one continuous nature corridor for the whole community to enjoy.

The latest work is the construction of the Longport Street Tunnel. This will be a pedestrian and cycle tunnel that will link Cadigal Reserve in Summer Hill with the light rail at Lewisham West. This area will boast new paths and parklands upon completion. The new Longport Street Tunnel is also designed to be microbat-friendly to preserve precious local wildlife. Stay tuned for

more updates on this biodiversity and active travel corridor.

Rozelle Interchange

A tsunami of traffic

When the Rozelle Interchange opened in December local residents experienced extraordinary delays in getting in and out of their suburbs including extraordinary delays in the morning peak.

Council took immediate action convening a public meeting at Balmain Town Hall and demanding that Transport for NSW front up to hear directly from affected local residents.

During the reprieve in traffic volumes over the school holidays Council has been acting to ramp up the pressure on the transport agency and Transurban, owners of Westconnex, to fix this mess.

I have established a panel of local citizens with expertise in transport, traffic and engineering to provide scrutiny of the mitigations being proposed.

Council's demands also include:

- Immediate, real-time disclosure of the traffic data and travel times for Victoria Road, the City West Link and the ANZAC Bridge.
- A review of the lane configurations on Victoria Road and the City West Link.
- Funding for public domain improvements and traffic infrastructure on Victoria Road that was left out of the Budget by the previous Government to be made available.


Lambert Park upgrade

Inner West Council is investing \$2 million to upgrade Lambert Park with a new, all-weather playing surface.

The last upgrade to the field was 10 years ago and it's been very well used but it's time for an update. Lambert Park is famously home to Australia's most historic football club, APIA. Since 1954, keen young players and the famous APIA Leichhardt Tigers have run out onto the hallowed ground. With APIA growing to 21 teams it's more important than ever that the ground is world-class.

The sporting ground upgrade will use a new infill that provides a cooler playing surface than rubber infield sporting grounds. The players will love it.

Balmain Town Hall

The Town and Country Journal reported on the opening of the new Balmain Town Hall on August 25, 1888 and described the main hall as "well filled by a large and fashionable audience." Flags stretched across the street and a brass band performed.

Designed by the then Mayor of Balmain, E.H. Buchanon, it took thirteen months from plans to opening. Its original cupola on the tower seems to have been blown off in a mighty storm in 1931 and despite attempts to have it replaced this was never realised. The orginal plans included a grand "banqueting room" as it was called, the main hall with its soaring and decorative ceiling, a stage and space for up to 1000 people. 3000 books had already been collected for the public library. The original view from the tower was famous: country, the harbour and the Parramatta and Lane Cove rivers offered a celebrated vista for all.



School safety

With school just back, Inner West Council Parking Services will be working with over 80 schools within the LGA to support the safety of our kids at the start of the new school year.

Key points to consider when dropping off children at school include:


- Always take care in 40km school zones
- Follow all parking signs these help keep your child safe as possible
- Park responsibly even if that means you have to walk further to the school gate
- No Parking means drivers must not leave a vehicle unattended and not be over 3 meters from the vehicle for 2 minutes
- No stopping in a bus zone even if dropping off passengers
- Never double park it is illegal and puts children at risk
- Always park and turn legally around schools and avoid dangerous manoeuvres like U-turns and three-point turns
- Always give way to pedestrians, especially when entering and leaving driveways
- Drop the kids off and pick them up on the school side of the road in your school's designated dropoff and pick-up area. Calling out to them from across the road is dangerous because they may run to you without checking traffic
- It's safest for the kids to get out of the car on the kerb side of the road to be away from passing traffic
