Summary

Council staff member, Simon Watts, Social and Cultural Planning Manager, provided an update to the group about:

- The Healthy Ageing and Direct Services Review.
- The context of Community Services and Culture in relation to the Community Wellbeing Survey.

At the time of amalgamation, it was noted that with Commonwealth Home Support Program changes, a review of Council's services configuration would be reviewed at some point. The changes to funding are a catalyst to review how it supports all older residents to achieve wellbeing. It is anticipated that options for changes will be brought to Council in November 2019. Meeting the aspirations of the Community Strategic plan requires new partnerships in support of older people, and new roles in policy, advocacy and program provision.

Mary Ciantar, Supervisor of the Healthy Ageing Programs team provided a short update about her team's role in the Healthy Ageing space. This role attracts some Commonwealth funding with a work plan to 2020 in place. The Healthy Ageing Team delivered an evaluation in 2018 of its programs and the area of communication was also highlighted. Council has been approached by organisations targeting new and pending retirees to address associated issues: socialisation, skill sharing, staying active and mental health (loneliness).

At the meet and greet in November 2018 many people expressed interest in contributing to improving communication in the community about opportunities for older people. Themes from November meeting included: Communication Strategies, age discrimination and caring communities and connections. NSW Ageing Strategy also provides outcome areas to focus on.

Ideas

- Marrickville Pay it Forward.
- Waverton Hub Model mirrored by <u>Agency hub</u> in Balmain peninsula.
- Assets based community development model Local Social was piloted in Leichhardt. Meet up groups (not council) across Sydney are evidence of a need to provide spaces for older people to socialise.
- Some healthy ageing programs in council have become independent Haberfield Choir, Women's shed. Some still supported but run by volunteer/s and committees such as HOPE lunch; Table Tennis; and Shared Cooking at Annandale
- Garden Care model in Canterbury area raised as something that could be replicated in inner west.

Actions

- Note that the group would like opportunities to provide input– Ageing Review; Community Wellbeing Strategy; supporting delivery of the Community Strategic Plan and Inclusion Action plan most relevant.
- Focus of future meetings:

- Scope Retirement symposium diverse cohorts of seniors across LGA and include:
 - Expo and stalls with a panel of speakers: volunteering, mental health, financial info
 - Con to provide information about Rosehill's Retirement Symposium each year
 - > Could facilitate shared experiences and need experienced facilitator.
- Dementia month September.
- Seniors Festival 2020.
- Input to Council to drive an age friendly community.
- Cross pollination with Inner West Aged Services Interagency and Inner west and Canterbury Elder Abuse Collaborative on projects.
- Send Communication plan
