Douglas Grant Memorial

During the early 1930's Douglas Grant worked as a clerk at the Callan Park Mental Asylum. It was during his spare time at Callan Park that he designed and constructed a large ornamental pond spanned by a replica of the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

Douglas Grant was an Aboriginal man from the Bellenden Ker Ranges in Queensland. He was skilled as an artist, taxidermist, draughtsman, wool-classer, labourer, DJ for a local radio station in Lithgow and a clerk. His other skills included having a wide knowledge of Shakespeare and poetry, and considerable skill as a bagpipe-player.

He was born in Queensland c.1885 and tragically his birth parents were killed in 1887. He was rescued by Robert Grant who was in Cairns on a collecting mission from the Australian Museum. Robert Grant sent the infant to Lithgow, NSW to be raised by his parents and he later adopted Douglas and raised him as one of his own children. Douglas went to school in Annandale, Sydney.

Douglas fought in WWI and in 1917 was wounded, captured and held prisoner at Wittenburg and then later at Wünsdorf, Zossen near Berlin. During his captive years be was a curiosity to German doctors, scientists, anthropologists and sculptors; Rudolf Markoeser modelled his bust in ebony. He also attracted considerable attention when he visited relatives of his foster-family in Scotland for his strong Scottish accent, his facial features, and his bagpipe playing skills.

Esther Gallery

Esther Abrahams (c7769-1846) was an apprentice milliner from London sentenced to seven years transportation for the theft of some black lace valued at 50 shillings. although the evidence against her was circumstantial. It seems that she was pregnant when she was sentenced, as 6 1/2

months later she gave birth to Rosanna, father unknown, in jail.

In 1787 Abrahams and her daughter were transported when she was 17 on the First Fleet convict transport Prince of Wales. but transferred to Lady Penrhyn mid-voyage. She is the only First Fleet convict known to be the subject of a portrait. Her luck changed when she caught the eye of the First Lieutenant George Johnston on the way to Sydney, and on landing, moved in with Johnston becoming his de-facto wife.

They married some years after she had had seven children by Johnston. Her husband, Lieutenant-Colonel George Johnston, received extensive land grants, and he and Esther farmed and lived on this land with their children until the 1870s when it was sold and sub-divided for residential development.

The main street of Annandale is named after Johnston, and the gates of their property now stand in the grounds of Annandale Public School. It was said that the grass in front of Annandale House would not grow under certain trees, as they had been used to hang convicts.
