Historical Notes

This was erected in about 1908 as a six-roomed house, by Frank Stoker, who also lived there. Earlier the land had been the tennis court of Quong Tart's property, which was sold to Stoker by his widow Margaret Tart. In earlier times the land had been Lot 1 of the Fernbank Estate, first auctioned in 1886.(1) In the 1920s W Hutchings became the owner and remained so until at least 1933.(2)

Physical Description

Single-storey Queen Anne house with two asymmetrical facades. A bracketed gable addresses each street, with an L-shaped verandah between them. It is a pleasing design in dark red brick with liver-brick trim, tuckpointed on both facades. The roof is slate with terra cotta trim and there are fine terra cotta vents in the gables and sunbursts in the ridge gablets. The chimneys have unusual tops corbelled outwards. The verandah has heavy square timber posts, paired except at the corner, where there are three, all supported by brick piers with stone copings. The windows in the gables have simply bracketed hoods. A bullseye window is beside the entrance, which is in an arched recess facing Arthur Street. The front gate, however, is in the quieter Shepherd Street. A later wing has been built at the west end of the Arthur Street frontage, but it is visually separated from the house facade by a fence. The garden includes mature planting which partly screens it from the streets.
