Historical Notes

The Post Office was erected in 1926, replacing the older building of 1889. A Telephone Exchange was built behind this, also in 1926, extending to Fox's Lane. Acquisition of the site to the north made a further Exchange possible in 1963. The Exchange on the west side of Fox's Lane was erected in 1987.

This 1926 building was designed by John Smith Murdoch. chief architect for the Commonwealth from 1919 to 1929 and who, as well as designing post offices, was responsible for many important buildings including the Provisional Parliament House in Canberra and major projects in other capitals including Forrest Place, Perth.

The Post Office site eventually extended behind the sites of 5, 7 and 9 Hercules Street. In more recent years, with changes to post office and telecommunications policies, the building was closed and vacated. At the present time it is still unoccupied.

Physical Description

The building is a simple reinforced concrete framed structure in several more-or-less self-contained parts. Its general character is that of a utilitarian building containing the former postal hall, with some evidence of original plaster detailing and finishes, and a pleasing facade.

The facade, designed in the Inter-War Georgian Revival style of architecture, is two-storeyed. symmetrical in form and detail, with five bays in face brickwork and two entablatures of painted cement render

A large addition, erected on the roof behind the parapet, intrudes into the streetscape presence of the building, as do two bus shelters built on the footpath in front, which obscure the facade.
