This is one of a fine pair of Victorian Italianate/Filigree houses which make an effective contribution to the streetscape despite some modification. #### **Historical Notes**

The exact date of construction of this house is not known, but one of the two appeared for the first time in the Rate Book in 1884, owned by G B Walker, and both had been built by 1885.(1) *Sands Directory* lists the first occupant in 1886; it was James F Carson, railway contractor. The name 'Waiwera' appeared also in that entry. In 1889 Mrs G Rowley was occupant. After that there was a fairly rapid succession of occupancies, only two of them lasting five years, viz Edward G Morley (1918-22) and Robert O Bagley (1924-28).(2)

By 1896 both this house and No 15 were owned by the estate of the Rev G Hurst, from which in 1899 they were acquired by Dr George Hurst, of 'Ecclesbourne', Blackheath. The first valuation for this property was recorded in 1909; it was £185 unimproved and £895 improved. In 1920, still owned by Dr Hurst, the building was described as an eight-room brick house with a slate roof, and valued at £180 unimproved and £875 improved.(3) By 1928, 'Waiwera' was in the ownership of Carl Gustav Sunderstrom, manager, of Alt Street, and the valuation was recorded as £405 unimproved and £1,050 improved.(4)

#### **Physical Description**

These are two matching two-storey brick-and-stucco houses on adjacent sites, designed in a composite of the Victorian Italianate and Filigree styles. Each has a narrow, asymmetrical facade, with a two-level verandah on one side and a narrow projecting bay on the other. The bay is treated with simple Classical detailing including pilastrated piers, recessed panels, an arched portal and a blind arch at the side. Upstairs the space within is treated as part of the verandah, becoming a kind of loggia or depressed tower with its own hipped roof. The main roof is hipped and, presumably originally slated, is now covered with tiles. The verandah has an outer corner column of cast iron, a framed frieze at the lower level, and cast iron balustrading at the upper level in a design registered in New South Wales by A T Rees & Co, iron founders, in 1883.(5) No 15 has an upper frieze also, but the one at No 11A is missing. Other Classical detailing in stucco includes corniced chimneys and ground floor window architraves. A carport has been added to the side of No 15 and No 11A has a side drive. The front fences are not original.
