Historical Notes

The land in this vicinity was part of a grant to Augustus Alt, later incorporated into the Ashfield Park Estate. In 1883 the parcel at the corner of Alt and Church Streets was owned by a person named Pamfret.(1)

The Field Book of the Water Board Detail Survey, dated 1892, shows six houses with similar footprints on the allotments between Alt Street and the unnamed lane, now Numbers 2 to 12 Church Street. The Rate Book of 1886 records that two of these properties were owned by the Land Company of Australia, while *Sands Directory* lists 'Carabeea', one of the six, as first occupied in 1890, by T H Holdship.(2) By 1896 all six were owned by the Land Company of Australia. The General Manager of that company was George Baker Walker, who lived in the large house 'Taringa', a block away. The Land Company had been incorporated in 1885 with the object of dealing in property. Walker was also a shareholder, along with other local citizens including the auctioneer John W Watkin, Mayor of Ashfield in 1884. By 1888 the company had offices in Melbourne and London as well as Sydney and owned the Gore Hill Brickworks. The company failed in the bank crash of 1893.(3) In 1898 John Cullen, described as 'gentleman, of Ashfield', acquired all six of the houses, which he continued to own until at least 1907.(4)

Physical Description

These four houses are the surviving part of an ensemble of six identical dwellings occupying land on the south-west side of Church Street extending north-west from Alt Street to an unnamed lane. The names of the houses were 'Gunyah' (No 2), 'Berida', (4), 'Mount Charles' (6), 'Monboulis' (8), 'York Villa' (No 10) and 'Carabeea' (No 12).

No 2, at the corner of Alt Street, is an existing individual heritage item, greatly extended. The houses at Nos 4 and 6 have been replaced by blocks of home units. Nos 8, 10 and 12 survive in condition ranging from fair to excellent and are elegant examples of the Victorian Italianate style of architecture. The usual array of style keys can be seen, as described in the individual Inventory sheets, but two additional features make the three houses at Nos 8, 10 and 12 very distinctive: one is the incised embellishment of the bay window piers, and the other is the inclusion of a lateral bay behind the facade featuring a window ensemble which is treated as elaborately as that of the front bay.
