History of the Item		

This land was auctioned in June 1879 as Allotment 24 Section 10 of the Underwood Estate. On 21 April 1896, this allotment plus others facing Ormond Street and Liverpool Road was transferred to Ashfield builder Samuel Benjamin. On 24 April 1896, he mortgaged these allotments for £2,500 to erect a series of cottages, which included Nos 29, 31 and 33 Ormond Street and 61 Liverpool Road. The mortgagee, Janet Coutts, specified that Benjamin erect houses with a minimum value of £700 each. She also specified that after building on lot 8, that Benjamin must build on lot 24, i e. this allotment. Benjamin transferred this allotment with the completed house upon it to Mrs Sarah Smith on 25 September 1896 for £1,000. The 1897 Rate Assessment Book showed that she was the owner of a cottage here which was occupied by J R Campbell. The house was generally let to tenants. By 1908, it was being listed as "Shandon", by which name it is shown on the 1912

Physical Description

Double fronted brick Federation/Queen Anne style cottage facing west across Ashfield Park. Marseilles terra cotta tiles with decorated ridge capping cover the roof. The main roof is of gambrel form with gables projecting at the front and at the northern side. Windows are arranged in pairs around the building with double hung sashes which are now obscured by security grilles. The front verandah returns along the northern side of the dwelling. The front door is obscured by a security door. There is a plain glass window pane above the front door. The verandah is supported by solid timber posts set upon brick bases standing upon a brick balustrade. The front fence is constructed of rendered masonry posts with cast iron spear pockets with a matching front gate, all of which are set upon a base consisting of both rough and rendered stone courses.
