

Historical Notes

This pair was erected on part of lots 17, 18 and 19 of Freshwaters Estate. Joseph Freshwater owned all the land (unimproved) between Arthur & Norton.(1) By 1887 he had built these houses and he also owned the one next door, where he lived.(2) The valuation register of 1908 indicates that both houses were owned by the estate of L Freshwater and that No 3, 'Oxford Villa', was occupied by William Vincent, foreman, and No 5, 'Cambridge Villa', by Mary Doyle, domestic duties.(3) In 1910, Stephen Wright occupied No 3 and in 1909 Charles Handkin occupied No 5. Alfred Moore was occupant of No 3 from about 1911 to 1931, but the tenancy of No 5 changed several times before Mrs Sara B Wilson became occupier in 1925.(4) By 1928 both houses were recorded as being owned by D Croak, c/o J A Sommerville & Co, Ashfield. In that year 'Oxford' was valued at £228 (unimproved) and £725 (improved) while the value of 'Cambridge' was £240 (unimproved) and £725 (improved)(5).

Physical Description

A pair of two-storey Victorian Filigree terrace type houses built of brick, with fronts only rendered and lined in simulation of ashlar. They are erected on allotments wide enough to permit a driveway beside each dwelling. No 3 has a corrugated metal roof with a bullnosed roof over the verandah, while No 5 has a concrete tile roof and a tiled skillion verandah. Each house has arched openings with label moulds. Ground floor windows are paired and upstairs, two pairs of French doors open on the the verandah. The cast iron balcony balustrade iron has the lily design which was registered in 1883 by A T Rees & Co.(6) The party wall extends above the roof as a parapet and the main eaves have bracket motifs. The firewalls have eaves-stops. The chimneys are rendered and have corniced tops with pots.
