Historical Notes

This property is in an estate known as Smith's Subdivision, made in about 1912. The house was the subject of a Building Application made in 1916 by owner-builders Smith & Smith, of Hardy Street, Ashfield.(1) By 1917 it was owned by Henry G Grace and was named 'Glendower'. It 1920 the listed owner was Mrs Miriam Grace, home duties, and the recorded improved value was £825.(2) Mrs Grace continued as owner and was listed in 1962 as a pensioner; the improved value was £4,850.(3) The listed owner in 1987 was Neil Charles Grace and the property valuation was given as \$62,500.(4)

Physical Description

A single-storeyed brick house illustrating the California Bungalow style with an ensemble of timber valance detailing in the Art Nouveau fashion. The facade has tuckpointed brickwork in stretcher bond, with darker brick quoin motifs, above a rendered base. The side walling is of commons. The house has the usual tiled roof and there is a street-facing gable with panel-&-batten infill. There is a subsidiary gable wing, in which is a surface-mounted triple-light window having leaded glass and a fine bracketted hood. The verandah has a brick balustrade with a curved top. A carport is attached to the side wall. The front garden is simple, with a hedge instead of a fence, and a curved path paved with encaustic tiles. The driveway is brick-paved.
