This allotment was transferred to James Addis, builder of Croydon Avenue in 1889. He transferred the land to Philip Kiefer, landowner of Ingleburn on 22 February 1899. This cottage occupied by Horace Hankin appears in the 1911 Sands Directory. Some years later, Hankin purchased the cottage. It may have been extant before 1911. This is simple pattern timber cottage probably of a prefabricated pattern available from a number of manufacturers such as Goodlet and Smith or George Hudson and Sons.

It was named "Burdett Lodge" by 1914.

Physical Description

Vernacular timber cottage with transverse gambrel roof. Single storey construction. The roof is now clad with corrugated galvanised steel in long length sheets. Symmetrical form on either side of a central doorway. There are wide weatherboards (feather-edged?) on the front of the cottage. A verandah extends across the front supported by square stop chamfered timber posts. A valance base extends across this verandah under the eaves but there is no valance infill. A bullnose roof clad with corrugated iron covers the verandah roof. Vertical tongue and groove boards enclose the verandah at either end. There are paired double hung sash windows on either side of the main doorway. No chimney. The original square timber electricity pole survives on this building. A front fence of squared timber pickets with wire mesh gate adds to the completeness of this cottage.
