Historical Notes

The site of this house was part of the 'Ambleside' estate when it was owned by Effie Fletcher, widow of John Fletcher, who subdivided it in 1922 into 13 allotments of which this is Lot 8. Yeo Avenue was first documented in 1925.

In 1925 a Building Application was lodged by the Dulwich Hill builder A S R Andrews (as owner/builder) for the construction of this house, described as a five-roomed brick cottage having an estimated value of £950. Andrews then owned the four allotments, now Nos 2-8. At the same time he lodged BAs for the other three sites as well. The first occupant of No 6 was Miss Emma Amelia Gardner, who then purchased the property from Andrews for £1,390. Miss Gardner occupied the property until 1932-33. The property passed by deed of gift from Miss Gardner to Norman Richard Gerringe, who sold it in 1936 to John Wright, master butcher, of Liverpool Road, Ashfield. Wright paid £900 for the property. He remained owner until 1937, when it was bought by John Burfitt Poole, customs officer, for £1,200.

In 1961, still owned by John Poole, the property had acquired a tool shed, and its improved value was listed as £5,500 (\$11,000)

The name 'Bangala' is not recorded in any of the Sands entries.

Physical Description

The house is a very intact double-fronted, triple-gable example of the Inter-War California Bungalow style of architecture. It is part of the harmonious ensemble of Nos 2 to 8 Yeo Avenue and the most original of the four residences. The house is a solid building in liver-coloured brickwork, with panelled gable infills, tiled roof, and a front verandah under the secondary gable supported on three brick piers with colonettes and a brick balustrade. French doors open on to the verandah and there is a hooded bay window with casement sashes. The front garden is simple and pleasing and there is a matching (presumably later) brick front fence and timber gate.
