History of the Item		

Building on this site, which was originally part of two allotments, was restricted to two buildings by covenant. In August 1937, the land was transferred to Cecil Hudson, timber merchant of Haberfield. In September 1937, the land was released from the restrictive covenant. Hudson then mortgaged the site in November 1937 to the Commercial Banking Company, probably to erect these flats. The land acquired its current boundaries when he transferred it, probably with these flats upon it, to Ethel Harris, a spinster of Granville, in February 1938.

Physical Description

Two storey brick block of flats incorporating four flats. Very square appearance, with some Inter-war Art Deco detail. Built of brick with mixed colour range of bricks, mainly browns. Hipped roof clad with multi-coloured Marseilles terra cotta tiles. Elaborately detailed brick entrance in texture brick with restrained square terra cotta tile decoration at each corner. A fixed stairwell window above the main entrance has an Art Deco pattern in the glazing bars. The symmetrical placement of windows on either side of the main entrance gives this building a formal appearance. The window sets closest to the centre consist of paired double hung sashes. Those further away are double hung sashes on either side of a fixed glass pane. A low brick fence of bricks identical to the main building is at the front.
