#### **Historical Notes**

On the H E C Robinson Map of the North-East Ward of Ashfield (undated but from c 1910) the sites along Ramsay Street are shown as not being part of the 'Residential District', because they were deemed appropriate for commercial-retail development.(1) This particular site was bought in 1910 by James Loudon, for whom this pair of shops and dwellings was built.(1) Sands Directory for 1913 listed the first tenants as E L Rheuben & Co, drapers (No 133) and Mrs E McCourt, ham and beef shop (No 135). By 1917 the ham and beef business had changed to that of a fruiterer. In 1922 the owner of the pair was Percival J Loudon, of Lewisham and the tenants were Mrs Mary Garrett and James Bleakley. By 1952 the address of the owner, Percival J Louden had changed to the Pacific Hotel of Manly and he had sold the property to Leonidas Ploudias, cafe proprietor, of Boorowa.

Mr Ploudias was still the owner of the property in 1958, when the improved valuation of No 133 was £5,350 and that of No 135 was £5,500.(2)

### **Physical Description**

A pleasing pair of shop-and-dwelling occupancies which, like Nos 129-131 next door, and despite having been altered, exhibits some of the character of John Spencer-Stansfield's work and so he is the probable architect. The facade above the footpath awning is a brick and stucco composition, divided by piers projecting above the parapet line. It is marked by two-ring brick semi-circular arches with stucco keys and label moulds, framing recessed balconies which originally had timber balustrades. The fenestration within appears to be original, with a door, sidelghts and toplights in each. A moulded string course forms the base of the stuccoed parapet, curvilinear at the skyline and patterned by narrow brick bands and ribs.

The shopfronts have been altered.
