#### **Historical Notes**

This is one of two identical adjoining pairs (the other is Nos 146-148) in the Dobroyde Subdivision No 2. The vacant site was owned by McKenzie & Belisario in 1908, when it was purchased by William John Genge, a prominent landowner and developer in Ashfield.(1) In 1915 a building application was lodged on behalf of George by Potter Bros, builders, of Croydon, for the erection of these four 4-roomed cottages, each pair valued at £1,350. They were completed in February 1916. They were owned by William John Genge until 1928 when, after his death, the two pairs were inherited by William Thomas Genge.

W T Genge owned the four residences until at least 1961 and in that year their improved valuations were recorded as £3,500 each.(2)

The four cottages were tenanted virtually without break from 1916. The first tenants were Harry May (No 150, for one year) and Murdoch Maclean (No 152, for four years). George York rented No 150 for six years, from 1920 to 1925, but the other tenancies changed more frequently.(3)

This property is Classified by the National Trust of Australia (NSW).

## **Physical Description**

This semi-detached pair of houses is situated on a site sloping up from the higher side of Ramsay Street. They are essentially identical to their neighbours at Nos 146-148. The building is single-storeyed, of red-brown brick on a sandstone base, with a tuckpointed facade and side walling in common bricks. Steps with tiled risers lead to each verandah, through a three-ring dark brick arch with a modelled label mould and red-brown brick abutments. The pair of arches so formed is crowned by a rendered gable emphasising the entrances and bearing a plaque with a modelled Australian coat of arms, 'Advance Australia'. The twin stairs, with marble treads, are separated by a fence of metal rails, while the front dividing fence is pickets. Each verandah has a skillion roof, brick balustrade, a timber post, a curved valance and an enclosed end. A three-light casement window of the front room faces each verandah. The hipped roof is clad in diagonal asbestos-cement tiles with terra cotta trim. Chimneys are rendered with moulded tops.

No 150 has a concrete paved area instead of a front garden, and a picket fence. No 152 has a simple front garden, a low brick plinth and end pier instead of a front fence, and a side boundary fence of pickets.

- (1) William J Genge's own house formerly on the site of the St Joan of Arc church in Dalhousie Street was one of several suggested by the Council to the editor of the *Australian Home Journal* in 1907, as a residence worthy of publication in the *Journal*.
- (2) Information about ownership and valuations comes from the rate books and the Valuer-General's records in the Archives of Ashfield Council.
- (3) Occupancies are recorded in the yearly editions of *Sands Directories*.
