#### **Historical Notes**

This house is in the Dobroyde Point Subdivision, owned by the Haymarket Permanent Land Building & Investment Company. The original purchaser is not known,(1) but in 1912 the site was vacant. By 1913 the house had been built and was owned and occupied by Alfred Haighow (sic), who in 1915 gave it the name 'Yaralla'. The Haymarket Company had its own architect and so it is likely that the house was designed by him. *Sands Directories* list other occupants after 1926, but the property was named 'Dobroyde Grange' from 1928. Then in 1940 the owner was listed as 'the estate of Alfred Hayhow'. In 1961, the property was owned and occupied by Vivian Alfred Hayhow. and in that year the improved valuation was recorded as £6,500.(2)

## **Physical Description**

A very fine house, single-storeyed, with brick walls on a sandstone base, and a hipped roof of slate trimmed with terra cotta including decorative ridges and terminals. It was designed in the Queen Anne style of architecture. The characteristic L-shaped front has an impressive octagonal, pyramid-roofed and glazed bay with a mitred slate roof. Between this and the other side of the facade is a verandah, surmounted by a gable having a shingled and panelled tympanum, all supported on paired timber posts with decorative infills and curvilinear tulip-motif brackets. The verandah has brick balustrades with downswept curves infilled with steel balusters, and a glazed end. The windows have casement sashes, leadight glazing and bullnose brick sills. The chimneys are pebble-dashed with brick embellishment and terra cotta pots.

The front fence is brick and from the gate a tiled path leads to the verandah steps which have marble treads, tiled risers and pedestal sides. Steel double gates on the left lead to an area of hard standing, and a steel gate on the other side leads to a side path. The garden has a simple layout out and planting.

### **Information Sources**

- (1) The 1912 Ashfield rate book is so badly damaged that the owner's name is illegible.
- (2) Information about owners and valuations comes from the rate books of Ashfield Council, found in the Council Archives. Occupants are listed year by year in *Sands Directories*.
