#### **Historical Notes**

Some earlier historical data are given on the Inventory sheet for the group.

Around the turn of the 19th century Charles Hedger, of Paddington, owned allotments 23 and 24 and 25 of Section 5 of the Underwood Estate. A weatherboard cottage straddled the rear of both lots, occupied by Charles Stall, laundryman. Hedger sold the allotments to C H Cramond, whose builder, named Davis, made a building application in March 1909 for the erection of two brick residences, one on each side of the old cottage, the land being re-subdivided accordingly. They became Nos 11 and 13 Grosvenor Crescent. His application was approved 'if Weatherboard Cottage at back is re-moved from ground.' It was removed and a second building application was made by Davis later in 1909 for a third residence, now No 12, on the land so vacated.(1)

In 1922 the owner-occupier of No 12 was R E J Paton. In 1952 it was purchased from Paton's estate by Charles Oscar Johnson, of Campsie. It was then named 'Mie Gymph'. In 1952 the property valuation was £665 unimproved and £2,150 improved.(2)

#### **Physical Description**

A general description of the three similar houses, of which this is one, is given in the Inventory sheet for the group.

In this house the front verandah has been enclosed as a room. The front garden area is used as hard standing.
