DESCRIPTIO						
A suite of three shops with dwellings at first floor level. Its three bay design evokes a pleasant residential character. The						
shopfronts have all been altered but the suspended steel awning effectively separates the largely intact upper storey. There, the two side						
bays, gabled with parapets, embrace a recessed centre bay. The gables have darker brick dressings, which include quoins and pseudo-						
strapwork laid in stack bond, with lighter panels laid in vertical stretcher bond altogether most innovative detailing. The side windows,						
Tudor-arched, have brick and render dressings and leaded casement sashes. It is also notable that the half pitched or 45° roof composition						
results in an asymmetrical main roof, the rear slope being less.						
MODIFICATION:						
All three shops have been changed. Upstairs, the central window has been crudely attered, its timber joinery replaced by aluminium.						
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
