History of the Item

In 1892, Ashfield widow Emma Abbey bought this land from the subdivider George Griffiths. In July she mortgaged it to architect David Elphinstone. Elphinstone was a significant local builder and architect who was responsible for many fine buildings in Ashfield and elsewhere. Emma Abbev lived next door to David Elphinstone. When her husband was killed in an accident, she arranged with Elphinstone to erect this house, into which she came to live. David Elphinstone was responsible for the erection of a number of houses on Prospect Road nearby.

Physical Description

Single storey double fronted masonry cottage of Victorian Italianate style. The front walls are covered with stucco with those at the sides left as plain brick. Transverse hipped roof with gable projecting to face the street. The main roof is now clad with coloured glazed Marseilles terra cotta tiles. Twin chimneys of stucco with plaster relief work and terra cotta pots survive. A faceted bay projects from the gable with a segmented roof which is now clad with Marseilles tiles. The windows on this bay are now square with those at the sides being narrower than the main window at the front. Windows are timber framed double hung sashes. The front door is a late Victorian four panelled door with glazed upper panels. There are sidelights and a fanlight. The front verandah roof is now of a low pitch and appears to have been the result of an attempt to "bungalowise" this building in the 1920s. This verandah is now enclosed. A tessellated tile pavement leads to the front door. The front fence consists of a dwarf stone wall with cast iron spear pickets with barley twist posts and a spear picket gate.
