#### **SUMMARY**

The Inner West Council is delivering a diverse range of socially inclusive programs, partnerships and initiatives broadly across the local government area for the benefit of the broader community.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Social Inclusion Strategic Reference Group note:-

- 1. the diverse array of socially inclusive programs, partnerships and initiatives that is being delivered by the Inner West Council.
- 2. that the Rainbow Roundtable is to be held Tuesday 29 August 2017at Newtown Neighbourhood Centre. That members share this information with their networks and encourage interested community members to book attendance.
- 3. consider ways in which the SRG members may be able to engage with the various initiatives noted in this report

#### **Background**

Council delivers, supports and facilitates a diversity of initiatives to support, celebrate, engage and build capacity in the broader community. These initiatives engage and /or target the broad diversity of the inner west community and are delivered across a spectrum of locations and often in partnership or collaboration with a vast array of community members, partners, schools, business or organisations.

The community can access the comprehensive calendar of activities via the 'What's On' page on Councils website at <a href="http://www.innerwest.nsw.gov.au/art---events/whats-on">http://www.innerwest.nsw.gov.au/art---events/whats-on</a>. The website provides further detail on each activity, bookings if required, undertake searches on types of activities or one can search for a specific program or event. Over the ensuing twelve months Council staff will be reviewing the range and suite of programs, activities and events currently being offered by the former three merged Councils to determine the priority activities for the newly created Inner West Council.

#### **Rainbow Roundtable**

Earlier this year Council staff and the LGBTIQ Working Party (formerly the Leichhardt LGBTQI Committee) planned and hosted the Feel the Love event at Petersham Town Hall to celebrate the beginning of Mardi Gras. The working party have subsequently planned a consultation with LGBTIQ communities to follow on from previous consultations held by former Marrickville Council. These consultations with LGBTIQ communities were held in 2012, 2013 and 2014.



The Rainbow Roundtable is an opportunity to bring the LGBTIQ communities together to discuss key themes arising from a recent survey of LGBTIQ service providers; and to prepare an action plan for input into Council's future planning processes.

The Rainbow Roundtable supports Council's commitment to promote inclusion, provide social hubs, meeting places and community events, and support diverse, multicultural communities and wellbeing (Priority 3 - Social Vitality, Creativity, Quality of Life - Inner West Council Draft Statement of Vision and Priorities).

The Rainbow Roundtable consultation revisits the issues raised in previous years and follows up on key themes arising from a survey sent to service providers earlier this year. It is anticipated that around 100 people will attend the event. The event will be facilitated by Jordan Raskopoulos as MC. It is anticipated that Jordan's celebrity status will attract attendees.

Following a welcome by Jordan, the participants will break into four groups – each with a facilitator and scribes, to discuss:


- bullying/harassment/homophobia
- access to services
- social isolation and
- mental/physical health.

Participants will have 15 minutes on each topic before moving on to the next one.

#### First Peoples Disability Network (FPDN) - http://fpdn.org.au/

Inner West Council is actively connecting with the First Peoples Disability Network Australia (FPDN). This is a national organisation representing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people (Australia's First Peoples) living with disability, their families and communities. The organisation is governed by First Peoples with lived experience of disability. FPDN was established informally in 2010 and registered in 2014 as a public company limited by guarantee.

FPDN's vision is a just and inclusive society, in which First Peoples living with disability are respected and valued for their culture, history and contribution to contemporary life, and in which their human rights are recognised, respected, protected and fulfilled. FPDN is a member of the Disabled People's Organisations Australia (DPO) alliance. FPDN won the Improving Advocacy and Rights Promotion Award at the 2014 National Disability Awards.

FPDN proactively engage with communities around Australia and advocate for the interests of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with disability in Australia and internationally. The organisation follows the human rights framework established by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, to which Australia is a signatory, and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

First Peoples with disability and their families are amongst the most seriously disadvantaged and disempowered members of the Australian community. FPDN give voice to their needs and concerns and share their narratives of lived experience. The organisation works for the recognition, respect, protection and fulfilment of the human rights of First Peoples with disability and their families.

FPDN work within a social model of disability, in which 'disability' is understood to be the result of barriers to equal participation in the social and physical environment. These barriers can and must be dismantled. The social model stands in contrast to a medical model of disability, which focuses on diagnosis.

FPDN contributes on policy and programs at state, territory and federal levels. FPDN shares knowledge and information with governments, and advocates for community control and community leadership. The organisation works to ensure that the advocacy work is genuinely informed by the lived experiences of First Peoples with disability. FPDN is proud to stand with other First Nations organisations on issues of national importance and proud to be part of <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/jhps.ncb/">The Redfern Statement</a> Group and the <a href="https://doi.org/">Change the Record Campaign</a>. FPDN is also one of four member organisations of the <a href="https://doi.org/">Disabled People's Organisations Australia (DPO)</a>.

#### White Ribbon Day Program

Inner West Council has allocated \$18,000 funding on an annual basis for four years (2017/18 - 2020/21) to continue to support White Ribbon Day initiatives and partnerships between Inner West Council, local community organisation's and Police Local Area Commands to present White Ribbon Day events.

Council will work in partnership with the four Police Local Area Commands of Leichhardt, Marrickville, Ashfield and Newtown as well as the two local Domestic Violence Liaison Committees to create a program to promote a 16 Days of Activism Against Violence campaign beween Friday 17 November to Saturday 26 November 2017.
